

## MAY GO ON RECORD FOR MOVING BUTLER

Northeastern Civic Body Hears  
Arguments, and Submits  
Matter to Committee.

Members of the Northeastern Civic Association, who heard two talks last night at a meeting held at Forty-second street and College avenue on the issues of the removal of Butler college from its present Irvington location, are expected to go on record at the next meeting of the association in favor of relocating the college. A motion was carried last night favoring the naming of a special committee to draft resolutions setting out the association's position in the Butler issue.

E. T. Graft, superintendent of schools, and Wallace O. Leo of the Mapleton Civic Association, each pleaded for the citizens of Indianapolis to back Butler college in deciding what is best for the city's interest. Both pointed out that the best interests of Butler college required a change in present facilities, although neither directly referred to favoring the proposed Fairview park site.

Mr. Graft said Butler had outgrown its present quarters. He said it was self-evident the college would be compelled to move to another site.

**Pleads Against Sectionalism.**  
"I feel that whatever will make Butler's progress and development greater will be the thing that Indianapolis citizens should get behind, and in such an effort forget sectionalism in the city to enhance the city's advantages," said Mr. Graft.

"Other institutions have had to go through such a painful experience that Butler is now facing. She has outgrown her present quarters and must hunt a new home. The answer of what steps will have to be taken for Butler is almost self-evident."

Mr. Leo urged that it would not be an economic waste to move Butler college, but would be to the city's advantage if some steps were taken to improve the facilities of the college. He desired any community selfishness and urged city-wide support of a move to make of Butler the biggest and best educational institution possible. Mr. Leo urged the association to back up the Mapleton Civic Association by adopting resolutions favoring a move of Butler college.

Arthur W. Eberhardt, president of the association, obtained passage of a motion authorizing the appointment of a committee to draft such resolutions to be presented at the next meeting of the association.
