The Black and Latino policy Institute (B&LPI) commends the African American Coalition of Indianapolis (AACI) for its effort to propose a much needed Black Agenda for Indianapolis.

We also recognize the coalition's efforts to raise funds to publish updated reports. This analysis, with recommendations, is a response to requests for additional input from the Black community.

Due to our international experiences regarding similar matters, here are comments on issues about community violence, as well as education.

Over the past 10 years, B&LPI has presented on the topic of community violence, and education, during international conferences in Sydney, Sao Paulo, Vancouver, Caguas, Tel Aviv, Seoul, London (2011 & 2013), Pretoria (2014 & 2018), and Rotterdam.

As the former director of the Indiana Commission on the Social Status of Black Males, I support the proposal to start an Indianapolis Commission for African American Males.

Through our conversations with mainly educators, students, and youth advocates we propose the following additions to the Black Agenda published in the May 15, 2020 edition of the *Recorder*.

"I woke up in the middle of the night screaming from a dream. This had never happened to me before. I was running in downtown Indianapolis through a park filled with war memorials and tombstones, giant obelisks and monuments to the dead, and a small man stood on the marble steps, his face covered by a hood and he told me to turn around, but I did not."
