Feb 3 The Federation of Civic Clubs is formed and will meet monthly at Chamber of Commerce. Chamber president Chas. F. Coffin says organizing will help improve their area and the city. Groups represented that day are: Mapleton, College Ave, North Central, and Northeastern Civic Associations; the Midway East Michigan Improvement and the Southeastern Civic Improvement Associations, and the Brookside Civic League.

Feb 7 Butler's Pres Dr. Robert J. Aley inaugurated as college president.

In 1927 Dr. Aley lead Butler's efforts to start a quota of only 10 black students (all female) per year could enroll at Butler. Feb 27 Rev. Clay Trusty, Sr. introduces John W. Atherton to Butler. Atherton will become responsible for getting the finances for moving Butler from Irvington to Fairview Park.

Rev. Trusty of 7<sup>th</sup> Christian Church will have to resign due to his affiliations with Catholics. The Disciples of Christ bring in none other than the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith, anti-Semitic pamphleteer and professional rabble rouser. In 1926 Rev. Smith becomes founder/pastor of Capitol Ave. Christian, 142 W. 40<sup>th</sup> St. which in 1928 becomes the semi-official church of Butler. He becomes Butler's Minister of the Chapel of the School of Religion which made him college chaplain. In 1934, he joins Louisiana Gov. Huey Long's depression era "share the wealth" campaign. Rev. Smith's association with Butler College during this era validates the college's infamous racist policies.
