GRAND JURY TO AWAIT REPORT OF FIELD MEN

NO CERTAINTY ABOUT SIPE SHORTAGE INVESTIGATION.

STATEMENT OF PROSECUTOR

With much depending on the examination that is being made now by field examiners of the state board of accounts, there is no certainty when the Marion county grand jury will begin officially its investigation of the shortage that was found recently in the funds in the office of Richard V. Sipe, then county clerk, according to information obtained today from William P. Evans, prosecuting attorney. Mr. Evans denied the truth of rumors that had been circulated that the investigation was to begin today.

The investigation by the field examiners, he said, will form a basis on which the grand jurors and the prosecuting attorney can base their interrogation of Mr. Sipe and the other persons that may appear as

SPINACH IS BLAMED FOR DEATH OF TWO WOMEN

THREE OTHERS SERIOUSLY ILL AT KENDALLVILLE.

EIGHT PERSONS AFFECTED

KENDALLVILLE, Ind., March 12.—Mrs. Raymond Walters, age thirty, and Mrs. Laura Bishop, age sixty-two, are dead and Mrs. Cecil Hoosinger, age thirty-one, is lying at the point of death due to poisoning believed to have resulted from eating spinach that had become contaminated at Lakeside Hospital here. Miss Frances Helmer and Miss Leta Skeels, nurses, are also seriously ill. The spinach was prepared Saturday, but none of the persons who partook of it became ill until late Sunday afternoon.
