## CHAIRMEN ARE APPOINTED FOR COMMITTEES OF FEDERATION OF COMMUNITY CIVIC CLUBS

Chairmen of the eight standing committees of the Indianapolis Federation of Community Civic Clubs have been appointed by Edward O. Smetten, president of the federation. Sumner Clancy, attorney, was appointed chairman of the city planning committee. He is a member of the Northeastern Civic Association. A program that he presented to the first meeting of tentative members of the federation to draw up the articles of incorporation resulted in the selection of Mr. Clancy for this particular chair. His plan was that a committee to take care of problems pertaining to the erection of factories and other business concerns in a residential neighborhood should be created, and this was incorporated in the federation's constitution. As Mr. Clancy outlined the idea at the federation meeting, no factory should be built in a community of homes without the consent of 50 per cent of the residents and 75 per cent of the property owners.

Interested in Plaza Project. William H. Moore, member of the College Avenue Civic Association, was named chairman of the committee on public improvement and building. Interest in the plaza project, county, state and government buildings, hospitals, orphanages, asylums, the construction of all buildings and provision of all public improvements will automatically be referred to Mr. Moore.

George W. Beaman, member of the Mapleton Civic Association, was appointed chairman of the public school committee. His lifelong interest in school problems, teachers, buildings, curricula and pertinent education matters fit him for this important post.

J. Stephen Fullen, member of the Enterprise Civic League of West Indianapolis, was appointed chairman of the public utilities committee. Mr. Fullen was connected with the federation's objection to the 7-cent fare issue raised by the street car company and Mayor Shank.

John F. White, president for twelve years of the Southeastern Civic Improvement Club, has studied city markets for many years and has been furnished with enough material and actual knowledge of the situation to entitle him to the chairmanship of the city markets committee of the federation.

Heads Park Committee. The eastern part of the city will be officially represented among the federation's committee by A. Leroy Porteus, president of the Brookside Civic Association. Mr. Porteus is also first vice-president of the federation. He becomes chairman of the parks and recreation committee. In view of the federation's recent endorsement of the park project for 12 1/2 acres of woodland lying between Thirtieth and Thirty-fourth streets in Dearborn street, Mr. Porteus may be able to offer the united support of the 25,000 persons officially reorganized in the federation.

Dr. Robert Repass, member of the Mapleton Civic Association, was made chairman of the public health and sanitation committee. His first task will be to convince the citizens of Indianapolis that health is a vital factor in building up a reliable citizenry.

Another committee was created to take care of all matters not provided for in the other seven. It was named the committee on miscellaneous affairs, and Clarence McPherson, president of the Woodside Local Civic League, was appointed chairman.
