

<h2 style="text-align: center;">HIGH SCHOOL FOR COLORED OPPOSED</h2> <p style="text-align: center;">Plan Will Be Considered by Buildings Committee Fri- day Evening.</p> <p>Establishment of a colored high school at school No. 17, West and Eleventh streets, where a junior high school for colored pupils has been operated for some time, will be given definite consideration at a meeting of the school board's committee on buildings and grounds Friday evening, it was said last night at a regular meeting of the board.</p> <p>A delegation of colored persons headed by Robert Lee Brokenburr, attorney, appeared before the board last night to protest against segregation of colored high school students. They were told the protest would be referred to the committee.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Rooms Needed at Technical.</p> <p>The buildings and grounds committee, at the Friday night meeting, also will consider requests of Milo H. Stuart, principal of the Arsenal Technical schools, for additional classroom space in order to accommodate the rapidly increasing enrollment at the school. Mr. Stuart, in a letter to the board, pointed out that all available space is now being used and that classes are being held in the basements of the barracks and several similar buildings, while lunch-rooms and corridors are being used for study rooms.
