Proposed Action Item

AACI will implement a plan to view bullying as an inherent outcome of a school system which does not appreciate that difference is the natural quality of each child who enters a classroom.

AACI will work closely with Merry Juerling (mjwith3@yahoo.com), co-creator of the <u>Strength-Based</u> <u>Learning Plan</u> (S-BLP), to study the intersectionality of student differences/student uniquenesses and school and classroom bullying.

AACI will support and enable the creation of a team of educators to set up 4-year longitudinal study of the effects of the use of the S-BLP on classroom and school bullying.

AACI will create Professional Development sessions for teachers to help them deconstruct the intersectionality of normalcy and dis/ability and move to change the classroom climate and school policies around to "normalizing" difference.
