

ASK RESIDENTS TO DECIDE UPON CAPITOL BUSSES

Park Commissioners to Bring Question of New Line Before Meeting Thursday.

The question of whether the People's Motor Coach Company will be permitted to operate bus lines on Capitol avenue will be submitted to residents along the thoroughfare at a public hearing to be held by the board of park commissioners, next Thursday at 1:30 p. m., according to announcement made yesterday.

A. Smith Bowman, president of the bus company, sent a written request to the park board a few days ago, agreeing to pay a per cent of the fares to the city if permitted to operate the busses on Capitol avenue, which is a boulevard and controlled by the park board. The company already operates lines on several other streets.

Residents Protest.

Representatives of the Capitol Avenue Protective Association attended the park board meeting yesterday to protest against establishment of the new line. Members of the board asked that these representatives, as well as other interested residents on Capitol avenue, attend the hearing next Thursday. Mr. Smith also was asked to be present and Robert I. Todd, president of the Indianapolis Street Railway Company, will be requested to submit data on bus operation.

Councilman Walter W. Wise, who had announced that he would attend yesterday's meeting to urge purchase of property at St. Clair street and Arnolda avenue for a Haughville playground, made an inspection yesterday morning of another site at Ketcham street, just north of Tenth street, and informed the board he was inclined to favor this property.
