

HUSTLING HUNDRED FOR MORE SCHOOLS

**Organization Adopts Resolution
Deploing Crowded Conditions
of Local Institutions.**

Resolutions deploring the present crowded condition of the Indianapolis schools and commending the school board on its building program outlined to provide more adequate quarters for city school children were adopted by the members of the Hustling Hundred at a meeting held last night in the Englewood Christian Church.

The resolutions, introduced by Dr. Homer W. Cox, pointed out that an injustice was being done to the school children of the city in failing to provide better school buildings. The announced policy of the school board to build additional school buildings was indorsed. The civic league members, who spoke to the school board, urged that the present school board be permitted to continue in office until the program outlined could be carried out.

W. J. Quillin, president of the organization, who spoke in favor of the resolution and urged the other members to support it, declared, however, that he was not wholly in sympathy with the move to build more auditoriums at this time. He insisted that the efforts of the school board should be directed specifically to providing more room in which to hold classes.

Drive on Crime Indorsed.

A resolution commending the city administration for its efforts to curb lawlessness, particularly the part Mayor Shastok had taken personally in supervising the law enforcement program, was unanimously adopted.

Although the organization at a previous meeting adopted a resolution which opposed the removal of Butler college from its present location, it favored last night to back the "better Butler college move to Fairview park" and show "a game losers' spirit" in behalf of the policy agreed upon by the college board. The Rev. Frank E. Davidson, pastor of the Englewood Christian Church, an alumnus of Butler college, who is also a member of the Hustling Hundred, spoke in favor of boosting the new Butler move.

Mr. Quillin was re-elected without opposition as president of the organization. Other officers named were Harry Carter, vice president; Lupton Wilson, re-elected secretary, and Russell DeGraffenreid, re-elected treasurer.

The club will hold its meetings in the future in the new \$25,000 Community hall, which was formerly dedicated Sunday afternoon. Plans have been made to complete the installation of the heating system of the new building.
